# NCAA Approves Women's Wrestling As a Championship Sport!!

- On 1/17/25, the NCAA approved women's wrestling as a championship sport.
- It becomes the 91<sup>st</sup> championship.
- The first NCAA women's championship will be in 2026.
- Gorms is still hoping one day the NCAA men's & women's will be at the same arena, same time, same weekend.
- All 3 divisions will compete in the same championships until there are enough teams in a level to break away on its own.
- The NCAA was formed in 1906.
- It took 118 years, but finally the NCAA has wrestling for both sexes as championship sports.

# A quick history of women's collegiate sports organizations.

- Women's intercollegiate athletics were first formed on a national basis in 1941.
- In 1956 the Division of Girls & Women's Sports (DGWS) was formed by representatives of 3 organizations the National Association for Physical Education for College Women, the National Association for Girls and Women's Sports, & the American Federation of College Women.
- In 1971 the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) was formed.
- 1972-73 was the first academic year for AIAW championships. It had 8 different sports.

# A little more history of women's collegiate sports organizations.

- In 1981-82 the NCAA included women's sports.
- After the 1981-82 academic year the AIAW was legally dissolved.
- During the 1981-82 season, there were some female sports that had NCAA & NAIA championships.
- During the 1981-82 basketball season, 17 of the top 20 teams opted for the NCAA over the AIAW, this proved the end of the AIAW.
- At its peak, the AIAW had almost 1,000 member schools and 19 different sports.

# The start of women's intercollegiate wrestling

• Enough on the big picture of the DGWS, AIAW, & NCAA, let's explain the beginning and early days of women's intercollegiate wrestling.

### A women's collegiate national tourney began in 2004 and in 2008 it begat the WCWA.

- Before there was NCAA, NAIA, and NCWA women's national tourneys there was an independent national championships for women.
- This started in 2004.
- Bring together women's collegiate wrestlers and let's see who is the best.
- In 2008, the Women's College Wrestling Association (WCWA) was formed to provide a competitive structure.

# 21 years of intercollegiate women's wrestling national tourneys.

•We have had women's wrestling national intercollegiate tourney since 2004. This is older than YouTube or Twitter. It is old enough to drink legally.

# In 2009, the NCWA became the 2<sup>nd</sup> organization to provide a women's intercollegiate national tourney.

- In 2009, the NCWA started to include a women's national wrestling tourney.
- The NCWA was formed in 1997 to fill a gap in the wrestling community. It was designed to provide more opportunities for people to wrestle in college.
- The NCWA is a much more budget friendly option than the NCAA or NAIA.

 The NAIA voted to approve women's wrestling as its 28th national championship on April 9, 2022. Prior to this, there had been three NAIA women's wrestling national invitational championships. The winners of the Invitational Championships are still recognized as National Champions.

# •What is the NCWWC & when did they join the party?

# The NCWWC is the precursor to the NCAA for women's wrestling.

- The National Collegiate Women's Wrestling Championship (NCWWC) is the precursor to the NCAA Women's Wrestling Championships.
- Since women's wrestling only recently (2020-21 season) became an NCAA Emerging Sport (ESS) and the NAIA had its first women's championships (as an NAIA invitational) in 2019, the WCWA was on its way out.
- The WCWA had its last national championships in 2020.
- The schools from the NCAA needed their own championship and they could not call it the NCAA Championships until the NCAA announced women's wrestling was a championship sport. That starts in 2026.
- The NCAA schools had their championships and called it the NCWWC.

# The first NCWWC tourney was in 2020, the first NCAA tourney will be in 2026.

- The NCWWC, the de facto NCAA women's wrestling tourney began in 2020.
- Champ sport
- We will have the 1st official NCAA tourney in 2026.
- Since we now had an NAIA, NCWA, & NCAA national tourneys, the WCWA dissolved and passed the baton.
- Thanks for all the work the WCWA put in to make this all a possibility.

#### NCAA Transition quick summary

- For years, the NCAA forced a school transitioning from one division to another to wait 4 years before they could compete in the national championships.
- There is also a waiting period for teams that move from NAIA to NCAA.
- Dues to this Menlo & Vanguard can not compete in the 2025 NCWWC.
- Vanguard is competing the NCWA national championships in 2025.
- Yet another reason Jim Giunta and the NCWA makes more sense than some of the archaic rules at the NCAA.

## Good luck trying to understand the logic in the NCAA school transition rules.

- Gorms does not work for the NCAA and never has.
- Therefore, Gorms does not understand the logic or reason for this rule.
- Gorms is old enough to not try and figure somethings out that large organizations and their attorneys do.
- So much is changing in the NCAA (transfer rules, NIL) and coaches come and go so quickly at times that Gorms would not be surprised if the transition rule will change soon.
- On the other hand, the transition rule might be so far on the back burner, it could be here for a while.

# The NCWA had a round robin for 7 teams at the championships.

- The 2025 NCWA National Duals were in St. George, UT.
- The NCWA usually has much smaller budgets than the NCAA or NAIA teams.
- The travel can be cost prohibitive for many schools.
- The NCWA had a round robin format.
- All 7 schools wrestled the other 6 schools.
- The placements were determined based on the round robin records.

## NCAA women's wrestling emerging status, championships status, only 1 division.

•Can we get a quick explanation on the NCAA Emerging Sport Status, championship status, and why there is only 1 NCAA division?

What are the requirements for a women's sport to become an Emerging sport and a championship Sport in the NCAA?

# The 20/10/40 rule in the NCAA for ESS & Championship Status.

Episode 41-44

To be considered for Emerging Sport status, the sport must meet the following requirements:

- The sport meets the NCAA definition of a sport
- At least 20 varsity or competitive club teams exist at NCAA member schools
  - At least 10 NCAA member schools sponsor or intend to sponsor the sport

The Committee on Women's Athletics can recommend an emerging sport to become an NCAA Championship sport once 40 NCAA member schools sponsor it. Once added to the Emerging Sports list, a sport has 10 years to achieve NCAA Championship status, after which it may be removed from the list.

# Currently there is just 1 division in NCAA women's wrestling.

- When the NCAA announced championship status for women's wrestling on 1/9/25 there were 96 NCAA teams eligible to compete in the NCWWC tournament across all 3 divisions.
- There were not enough (40) in each division to have 3 divisions.
- Eventually there will be with the way Moyer and so many others have been successful in starting women's teams.
- This is the way it works. Be patient. Start more teams.
- Gorms & Hazard are old enough to remember when there was only 1 national championship division for women's basketball. This was before women were part of the NCAA.

# The NCAA has 111 announced women's wrestling teams as of 2/16/25. We went over the ESS number in 2020-21 & championship in 2022-23.

# Women's wrestling has a larger increase in the number of women's NCAA teams than all other sports combined since 2018-19.

- We selected 2018-19 as the starting year because that was the first year the NCAA listed women's wrestling teams in their report.
- Wrestling does have an advantage here because it was our starting year and only growth could have happened for us to reach championship status.
- Many of the other sports are well established and do not have seen a decrease in the number of teams. Of the top 11 sports (if you still count wrestling), 5 are ESS.
- This is a growth vs mature industry situation we talked about in past shows.
- However, anyway you want to slice it wrestling is easily at the top of the list and has accounted for 52.5% of all team growth in the NCAA since 2018-19.
- That means wrestling has seen more growth than the other 29 sports combined.
- That is great news for our sports future.

# NCAA women's wrestling has very strong team growth numbers.

- Women's wrestling ranks #15 in NCAA women's team numbers.
  - We will soon pass Ice Hockey and rowing in team numbers.
- The growth of NCAA women's teams is lead far and away by women's wrestling since 2018-19.
  - The future is bright.
  - Three years ago (2/16/22), we did a show on women's wrestling.
- The name of the show was, "The future of Women's Wrestling is so Bright, I gotta wear shades."
  - The title has aged like a fine wine.

- 1) On 1/17/25 the NCAA approved women's wrestling as a championship sport, becoming the 91st NCAA championship (41-8).
- 2) Women's intercollegiate athletics was not formed on a national basis until 1941 (41-11).
- 3) The first intercollegiate women's wrestling championship was started in 2004 as an independent event. It was followed in 2008 by the WCWA (41-14).
  - 4) In 2009, the NCWA followed with its own women's national championship (41-20).
  - 5) On 4/9/22, the NAIA approved an official national championship for women's wrestling (41-20).

#### Episode 41 Kev's Notes #2

- 6) The NCWWC is a placeholder for the NCAA until NCAA has their first championship for women's for women's wrestling in 2026 (41-23).
- 7) The NCWWC increased from 58 teams in 6 regions to 96 teams in 8 regions from 2024 to 2025 (41-32).
- 8) The NCAA women's wrestling championship will only have 1 division as of 2025. This will change as the sport grows (41-45).
- 9) The NCAA has 111 announced women's wrestling teams as of 2/16/25. This places them 15<sup>th</sup> of 30 on the number of women's teams in all sports (41-46 & 41-48).
